You'll be mesmerized by its winter appeal as well as its dynamic blossoming from early spring through fall with a vibrant display of blues, pinks, purples, whites and yellows.



Full sun exposure (minimum of 6 hrs of direct sun per day)

AUTUMN JOY STONECROP - Sedum 'Autumn Joy'



An umbrella of flowers change from soft pink in August to a coppery bronze seedhead in November, atop pale green, succulent like leaves.

CARE: Older plants tend to split in the center if not divided. To keep the plant smaller and prevent it from flopping over, prune the tips 6-8" in late spring (this will also delay flowering).

BLUE AVENA GRASS - Helictotrichon sempervirens



A clump forming grass that resembles tapering pieces of steel-blue linguine collected in a porcupine-like dome with golden panicles in summer.

CARE: This highly adaptable grass is tolerant of sunbaked locations and poor soil of all varieties, and is ill-suited for shady, wet soils, which will lead to poor structure and floppy growth.

A loose rosette consisting of rounded basal leaves become linear as they climb wiry stems to the violet, bell-shaped flowers on top.

BLUE HAREBELL - Campanula rotundifolia 'Olympica'

CARE: Hardier than its delicate flower suggests, this plant performs well on rocky mountain slopes, dry meadows and prairies, and open woods, and tolerates a variety of soil conditions.



The harbingers of spring, Pasque Flowers boast starry, five-petaled, purple-flowers with fuzzy orange-yellow stamen.

CARE: Pasque Flowers are adapted to chalky and sandy soils at high elevations, and will not tolerate soggy soils. Overall, it likes to be left alone! Due to its long tap root, Pasque Flower resents transplanting or division. Goes dormant in summer - mark its spot with a stake to avoid accidentally digging it up.

EVERGREEN CANDYTUFT - Iberis sempervirens



Candytuft provides us with a generous display of small, pure white flowers atop mounds of deep green, needle-like leaves.

CARE: Will seldom need division, but prune hard at least two-thirds of the way back every few years in the summer to keep it vigorous and







This strongly aromatic plant is covered in miniscule hairs giving it a soft, grey-green





CARE: This plant grows prolifically in the arid mountains and prairies of the Western US in poor quality soils and tolerates drought very well.

NATIVE BLANKET FLOWER - Gaillardia aristata

The Native Blanket Flower boasts large daisies with reddish-brown/orange centers circled by ray flowers of yellow/bronze.

CARE: Blanket Flowers appreciate a bit of pampering the first season, and then take off on their own. Avoid planting in rich, moist soils, which can make the plants floppy and shorten their life-span. Once established it is very lowmaintenance, adaptable, and easy to grow.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN COLUMBINE - Aquilegia caerulea

The Colorado state flower! It is noted for its large, rich violet flowers with white centers and long spurs mounted on arching stems over blue-green foliage.

CARE: Avoid heavy, soggy soil. Division is not recommended, mature plants do not like to be disturbed. If foliage becomes ragged during high heat, cut foliage back to 3 inches above ground and new leaves will grow in.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN PENSTEMON - Penstemon strictus

OTY. 3



This penstemon's brilliant purple flowers form open spikes on stout stalks arising from narrow, glossy semi-evergreen leaves.

CARE: This semi-evergreen plant will thrive in rocky, poor and disturbed soils. It can be slow to establish, so be sure to weed around it regularly to improve establishment.



A Colorado native, this aster forms a bushy, multibranched clump with fine, daisy-like flowers that are violet/purple during early summer to fall.

CARE: An extremely low-maintenance plant, as a prolific native plant to our region it will do poorly in over-fertilized, rich soils.

TENNESSE PURPLE CONEFLOWER - Echinacea tennesseensis OR PURPLE CONEFLOWER - Echinacea purpurea

Large, upswept, daisy-like purple flowers with showy, rose-colored rays above sturdy yet thin green stalks.




CARE: Avoid planting this variety near other varieties of coneflowers to prevent overcrowding. Division is not recommended due to long tap

Plant Maintenance By Season

1AINTENANCE TASKS	PLANT
SPRING (AFTER FIRST GROWING SEASON)	
Cut back old growth to 6 inches before new growth begins to show.	Rocky Mountain Penstemon
Cut back old growth to 2-3 inches before new growth begins to show.	Blue Avena Grass, Rocky Mountain Columbine, Purple Coneflower
Divide mature plants in early spring every 3 years, as needed.	Autumn Joy Stonecrop, Blue Avena Grass, Blue Harebell, Fringed Sage, Native Blanket Flower, Rocky Mountain Penstemon, Santa Fe Aster
"Comb out" or remove dead foliage.	Blue Avena Grass, European Pasque Flower
SUMMER	
Once established, deadhead to encourage compact growth.	Evergreen Candytuft, Fringed Sage
Deadhead spent flowers to encourage new blooms and/or minimize self seeding.	Autumn Joy Stonecrop, Blue Harebell, Native Blanket Flower, Rocky Mountain Columbine, Rocky Mountain Penstemon, Santa Fe Aster, Purple Coneflower
FALL	
Leave last round of blooms to self seed and/or to provide food for birds.	Autumn Joy Stonecrop, Purple Coneflower, Rocky Mountain Columbine
Cut back to 6 inches in late fall.	Native Blanket Flower
Do not prune or cut back. Plant susceptible to winter damage if pruned.	Evergreen Candytuft, Fringed Sage, Rocky Mountain Penstemon, Santa Fe Aster


Plant by Number Design Suggestions




